

From the CEO...



July 5, 2022, marked the long-awaited groundbreaking for the first 10 houses at the Village of Hope, located along route 322 in West Decatur. This magic community is the first of it's kind multi-generational, multi-ability, inclusive co-housing.

The first cluster of houses

include duplexes, 1 bed, and 2 bed houses. The community will be affordable and target demographics including grand-parents and great-grandparents raising grandchildren, families living with Alzheimer's disease and related dementias and older adults who have been sole support for adult children with disabilities. Truly this will be a replicable model for providing supportive housing options for individuals and families as an alternative to institutionalization. Necessary services will be available from home and community-based providers, or other individuals those in need of service will choose. The utilization of smart technology will support those individuals experiencing a variety of conditions that may be barriers to independent living. The goal is to impact social determinants of health and provide disease self-management education for those living in the community to mitigate and resolve those issues that have historically led to institutionalization.



Our community will undoubtedly be recognized for creating this pioneering, innovative alternative, which will likely be replicated in other communities as well. On June 16, 2022 Mature Resources accepted ownership and management responsibilities for the Dimeling Senior Residence; in order to ensure that the 31 older adults who called the Dimeling home could remain there and not be relocated. The Dimeling has 33 units comprised of six 2-bed units and 27 1 bed units. Currently there are 4 units available for rent for those individuals who qualify. There's a blizzard outside and the Meals on Wheels vehicles cannot get through to deliver the daily hot meals to hundreds of consumers who depend on them. What can we do?

It always seems that just as summer arrives, we have to begin planning for the cold months. Groundwork is already being laid for the annual distribution of Blizzard Boxes.

Each year in October, the Agency acquires and delivers non-perishable meals in the cupboards of every Meals on Wheels and More recipient. Every Blizzard Box contains the nutritional equivalent of three full meals which meet standards set by the Older Americans Act. We anticipate sending more than 1500, three-meal emergency boxes to Meals on Wheels and More consumers across Clearfield County. These back-up meals stay on their shelves until such time that weather prevents us from making our normal rounds. It is then that we call the consumers to remind them that even though we cannot make it to their house today, they have their Blizzard Box waiting for them and they can eat some of the contents to tide them over.

Since 1983, funds have been raised locally from businesses, organizations, and individuals to fund this valuable program. This year we have several sponsors listed below.

- The CCAAA is looking for people to sponsor Blizzard Boxes for this coming winter.
- The cost to sponsor a three-meal blizzard box is only \$10.
- On the outside of each box is a label which states "These nutritious meals are provided to you by: (your name)." This gives you, the donor, some visibility for your support of the program, and helps the recipient relate to the real people in the community who have made the service possible.

We hope you will contribute generously to this valuable program. Blizzard Boxes are not funded with any state or federal monies. *In 2021 we raised \$17,541, and our blizzard box expenses totaled almost \$25,000.* It is your contributions that ensure homebound older residents of Clearfield County have something nutritious to eat during severe winter weather. 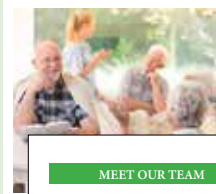

At the core of our community will be the Village Hall, the hub of the community, which will provide much-needed community services such as health services, grocery services, cafe, restaurant, and community arts and theater spaces. The Village of Hope will serve not only its residents but also the greater Clearfield community now and long into the future.

A Savings Tip from Your Friends at CNB Bank:

Having an emergency fund for unexpected expenses like appliance repair/replacement or vehicle maintenance seems like a no brainer but may seem difficult or intimidating to get started.

A fun and easy way to begin saving is using a calendar savings plan. Each week, set aside the dollar amount equivalent to the number of weeks since beginning the savings challenge, starting with \$1 in week 1 and finishing with Week 52 in week \$52.

In manageable weekly amounts, your savings will grow (not to mention you get the benefit of earning interest). At the end of the 52 weeks, your savings will amount to \$1,378.00, plus interest.

Here is an example of the 52-week schedule:

Week 1: Save \$1 – Balance: \$1.00

Week 2: Save \$2 – Balance: \$3.00

Week 3: Save \$3 – Balance: \$6.00

Continue this pattern for weeks 4-51

Week 52: Save \$52 – Balance: \$1,378.00

52 weeks can seem like a long time and life can easily get in the way. Luckily, this method can be applied in shorter or longer increments, too. For example, use an 18-week plan for \$171.00 in savings or alternatively, a 26-week plan will result in \$351.00 in savings. Or mix it up and do the plan backwards counting down from week 52. With a little discipline, you can easily build your rainy-day fund to a bright spot in your budget.

5 Tips to Survive Medicare Annual Open Enrollment October 15-December 7, 2022

Medicare's Annual Open Enrollment Period Starts October 15 and will run through December 7th, 2022. During this period, all Medicare beneficiaries can make changes to their health or drug plan coverage. Changes made during this period start January 1, 2023.

Everyone with Medicare is encouraged to review their current plan's coverage for 2023 to see if their plan still meets their needs. Pennsylvania Medicare and Decision Insite (formerly APPRISE) staff and volunteers in Clearfield County can help you review your 2023 Medicare options during Open Enrollment Period. Medicare beneficiaries who need help reviewing your plan options for next year are encouraged to call CCAAA PA MEDI at 814-765-2696 x 405 to schedule an appointment during OEP.

NEW VENTURE SPOTLIGHT: SHARED HOUSING

(As told to Joan Bracco)

I have become aware of a situation that I found very worrisome, not only being resolved, but actually achieving a happy ending. Being a born optimist, I love happy endings. This happy ending is truly inspirational.

One May 9th the Clearfield County Area Agency on Aging's CEO, Kathleen Gillespie, made our Agency employees aware that a personal care home in Clearfield County was closing on June 1st— one month in the future. She also informed us that all the residents had been made aware.

On May 9th, we at the Agency were notified that the personal care home had given the 15 remaining residents in the facility the notice that the closing would be June 1st and that they would need to find alternate living arrangements. Our Assessment Team assessed all the individuals in two days to help determine available options. A family meeting was scheduled so these options and other ideas could be explored. Six individuals were left without options. Our CEO reached out concerning the former "Helpmates Houses" in Clearfield and moved forward with a lease to buy from the owner. There were a few CCAAA employees who worked long hours and days to get the houses adequately prepared for older adults to move in as well as coordinating the receipt of donated furnishings to get both houses furnished in 5 days. We also had employee volunteers who donated time to deep clean both houses. Harris Cleaning pulled a crew together with no notice at all to help with the cleaning and landscape issues. Two of our Facility Technicians along with their supervisor transported "loads" of furniture from Curwensville to Clearfield and set it up in both houses with two days' worth of help from two other agency volunteers.

I interviewed three individuals for the first home and only one for the second home as the two others were unavailable. Both homes are lovely ranch homes, beautifully furnished with 3 bedrooms, 2 bathrooms, a living room and dining room, a kitchen, a laundry room, a front porch, and a large deck in back and both have a large yard. One of the homes has a fireplace.

First home: I began interviewing three residents at the first home. All three were there. I met Doris, who was sitting in the living room after receiving a tour of the home from Kathy Bell, who is the Manager of both homes and visits both every day.

Doris— "I like it here. I have a private bedroom, living room, dining room, kitchen, 2 bathrooms, a laundry room, and a large deck, plus a front porch. All three of us here knew each other from Marion Manor. We chose to live together. My three daughters and both sons (one lives in Alaska) come to visit, and my grandchildren visit. All of them really like the house. Donna and I play a dice game at the table in the laundry room. We have a worker who helps with housekeeping and laundry. I'm a diabetic and she sees we get our medication. I also use a walker."

Ronnie — "I really like it here at the house. I also have a private bedroom. I know I'm a lucky man who gets to have my housemates — these lovely ladies. We have a nice deck and backyard. We watch the neighbor's kids play on the trampoline."

Donna — "It's really nice living here. I love puzzles. It's true that I play dice games with Doris. We do watch TV some, but we love the deck and often have our snack in the evening on the deck. Everything's good."



The worker, Kristina, said that it's a really great job to have before going to college to become a nurse. "I love the residents here."

Second home: John — "I really do like it here. We, my two housemates and I, picked each other to live with." When John was asked what he liked best, he said "I like everything — it's all wonderful! I'm happy here."

These folks moved on June 6th and they also have a worker, Lisa. "I love my job here. I've been here almost four weeks. I look forward to coming to work every day. Usually, Virginia meets me at the door and tells me about the birds, chipmunks, and squirrels. She feeds them every morning. John likes to tell jokes.

Kathleen Gillespie, CCAAA's CEO, had this to say concerning the Agency's tremendous efforts and the residents helping that effort by deciding who would live in both houses and furnishing both houses. "I could not be more proud of the coordinated efforts of all those involved in this high pressure time sensitive project. The transition of the older adults from the personal care home to the shared living arrangement went much better than anticipated and the six are enjoying a wonderful experience. We now are providing shared housing for 9 older adults, all of whom would be in institutional care if not for this option."

Intake and Referral

Intake and referral specialists have knowledge of a wide array of community resources and can explain how to apply for them.

Person Centered Counseling

Person centered counseling provides critical connections to resources for individuals in the community. Trained resource counselors assist individuals in accessing public, private, Federal, State, and local resources regardless of age, ability and income level.

Caregiver Support Program

The caregiver support program provides support for those who are caring for an older adult, or for grandparents who are raising grandchildren.

Navigation Services

Navigation services can guide you and your family through confusing and at times overwhelming world of elder and health care. This is accomplished through expert staff and information to navigate through these systems and provide support when you need it most.

Transportation Reimbursement

If you are age 65 or over and travel using the Area Transportation Authority (ATA) CCAA can reimburse some of your cost. Call ATA (800) 252-3503 for additional information.

Care Management

Care managers have knowledge of local, State and Federal programs that can provide needed in home support. Using comprehensive assessments and person centered care planning, care managers work with older adults to create a personalized plan for the future.

Care Transitions

Care transitions is designed to make sure you have the support you need after you leave the hospital, rehabilitation center and nursing or personal care facilities. Through a 30 day program a transitions coach works with older adults to identify triggers, warning signs, gaps in care and other needs to help reduce re-admission rates. You want to stay home, and we want to help you do that.

Evidence Based Programs

Evidence based programs have been shown to have positive impacts on health outcomes. Clearfield County Area Agency on Aging Inc. is proud to offer a variety of evidence based programs including Healthy IDEAS, Diabetes Self Management, Chronic Pain Self Management and A Matter of Balance to our community.

Adult Day Center

Adult Day Services (ADS) are designed especially for older adults who want to remain in their community but who cannot be home alone during the day due to physical, social, and/or mental limitations.

Protective Services

Protective services investigators are available 24 hours a day 365 days a year to receive and investigate reports of abuse, neglect and exploitation. Anonymous reports of suspected elder abuse can be made to: 1-800-233-0249

Ombudsman

Residents of personal care and nursing facilities can get help resolving problems, learn about resident rights and participate in programs with peers through contacting a long term care Ombudsman.

Home Delivered Meals

Meals are delivered to over 700 residents of Clearfield County daily. Home delivered meals participants benefit from a nutritious meal and interaction with a home delivered meal driver. During winter months shelf stable meals are delivered in case of unsafe roads that interfere with meal delivery.
